#### **School Transport**

CBC is consulting on the future of school transport. This may seem a long way into the future, but the proposals may affect your children. The council is proposing that pupils will no longer receive free transport to their catchment school, but will be eligible to receive it at their nearest school. This will potentially affect pupils living in the surrounding villages where there may geographically be a closer middle or upper school. We always receive a mixed response when we pose the homework topic. Those that think the home work is just right and those that don't. Over the years, we have taken all comments on board and follow closely the research from the EEF (Education Endowment Foundation). The best impact of setting homework is that it must be linked to classroom work and be an integral part of the children's learning rather than an add-on.

In the past, we have kept away from digital homework due to the amount of time we are told children spend on their screens, but we can easily move to a balance of both. Homework should not be a chore, and it shouldn't be a battle with your children 15 to 20 minutes maximum should be spent on a piece of work. If your child is not able to access their homework without a significant amount of support, please ensure the class teachers are made aware.

Other things you could do beyond the set homework in maths include number bonds to 10 and 100. Times tables Yr 2 2,5 10, Yr 3 3,6, 4, 8 and Yr 4 all the tables. The children also have access to our digital subscription Purple Mash, which covers all subjects, Discovery Coding, Letter join, and Spelling Shed (KS2). Details of their logins should be in their reading records.

## Our learning this week

We love books! The children looked amazing in their World Book Day costumes on Thursday and we had such a variety of books to choose from. I was so impressed by the children's behaviour and enthusiasm in our whole-school world book day quiz – the library lovers won!

We have been continuing our learning about robots this week. The children designed their own robots, thinking about their purpose and design. We used the junk modelling materials in school to make our models, following our plans closely. I was so impressed by the children's ingenious designs — we had boxing robots, building robots, dancing robots and more!

We loved turning ourselves into 'kid-bots' and performing a robot dance. We made sure that we were following the instructions in the right order. You might want to try it yourself by following this link:

We loved World Book Day, and dressed in a huge range of costumes. It was great joining in all the different book related activities as well.




























#### Do we give the right amount of homework?

Maths homework is fine and mostly accessible without much support.

Sometimes the English worksheet doesn't have enough space to record answers, at times this homework can take a considerable amount of time and requires a lot of support/ encouragement.

Could there be a more creative/practical type of homework- as this may be more motivating than worksheets? I think it's just right. She enjoys the weekly spelling test and we read a book each night. I appreciate receiving a new book each day! Perhaps there could be more maths homework as that's not regular.

We are very happy though!

Sometimes the spelling test does not always match with the words they have had as homework.

I don't agree that homework is a necessity for young kids, however I am aware of the unsympathetic hell they face at Harlington so probably not a bad idea to get them used to some work. I like that they have the occasional week off for whatever reason and I do think that maths practice is the best way to learn maths.

We find homework really stressful. The children spend so long in school already and then to have to do extra work at home, with more than one child, is really difficult. My child doesn't usually want to do it and it's just another battle which we could really do without. I've read quite a few things that say studies have shown homework isn't really beneficial in primary aged children.

I think the children are given the right amount of homework with the right level of difficulty. It can be tricky for me to support the children, as they use very different methods to those we are familiar with from our own time at school - and I don't want to confuse them by doing things differently to the way they've been taught.

Just about the right amount. Along with the homework exercises, also like to see helpful resources to improve maths understanding and ability.

Focusing on reading and/or writing in small doses but regularly (most days) feels right. Yes I think it is a great balance of homework.

I think you could give more, with more variety, including digital options

I think to read every night is manageable, even with a tired child! The other homework is weekly and can be completed as and when, so this too is manageable.


I sometimes feel there isn't enough time to complete the homework. In yr2 they got a week to do spellings, now they get 2/3 days (i don't like doing homework at weekends as I think kids need a break) but we are having to spend an afternoon doing it otherwise there isn't enough time to learn spellings etc. Even getting homework a day earlier would be beneficial.

It would be good to have additional optional homework, even just some worksheets for us to do at home to deepen learning from class would be good.

I like that there's not too much structured homework in reception year. It's already a big change for the children. \*\*\* really enjoys school but he very much needs his downtime in the evenings and at the weekends.

We do his reading every night and other bits of learning as and when he is receptive to it. I think at this stage in children's education it's really important to protect their enthusiasm and not "put them off" so to speak.

We really enjoyed doing the fiction reading challenge as it felt unpressured and fun. We are just starting the non-fiction reading challenge, which I think is a great way to introduce a more structured approach to homework (focus on specific topics, doing research, presenting your findings, etc.) However, again, I like that there is no pressure and we can allow \*\*\*'s natural interests and enthusiasm to guide us.

As part of a democracy, we have the right to protest. It is one of the ways a group of people can show when they strongly agree or disagree with something and have their voices heard.








We have the right to share freely with others what we learn, think and feel. We can do this by talking, writing, drawing or any other way unless it harms other people.





